Jeffery Beasley

Jeffery T. Beasley was appointed to serve as the Inspector General for the Florida Department of Corrections (FDOC) in October of 2011. The 200 member Office of the Inspector General (OIG) for the FDOC is responsible for all criminal and administrative investigations within and relating to the 26,000 person state agency. Additionally, the OIG maintains an auditing unit which is responsible for both proactive and random audits and contract reviews designed around the concept of identifying and eliminating fraud and waste within the agency. The OIG also contains an intelligence unit responsible for collecting and analyzing a wide range of information within the state prison system and 30 member interdiction and canine unit.

Prior to his current assignment, Mr. Beasley worked as a Special Agent Supervisor for the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) located at Headquarters in Tallahassee, Florida. Mr. Beasley was assigned to the Florida Fusion Center which is the hub for all intelligence activities within the state of Florida. Within the intelligence section he supervised Special Agents and analysts responsible for collecting and analyzing information relating to narcotics, violent crimes, domestic security, and economic crimes and developing the information into actionable or strategic products.

Before accepting a position with FDLE, Mr. Beasley was a Sergeant with the Escambia County Alabama Sheriff's Office where he was a supervisor within the Criminal Investigation Division – Major Crimes/Narcotics. His investigative experience includes assignments as an agent within a multi-jurisdictional drug task force, a special deputy U.S. Marshal assigned to a regional fugitive task force, assignment to an ATF task force investigating and preparing federal gun cases, and assignment to a special victims unit designed to investigate domestic violence and sexual assault crimes against women and children. Mr. Beasley also worked as a juvenile probation officer and a state correctional officer prior to entering the law enforcement profession.

Mr. Beasley earned his Master of Science degree in Criminal Justice Administration and his Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice from Troy University. He also obtained an Associate in Science Degree and an Associate in Applied Sciences degree from Jefferson Davis Community College.

Mr. Beasley currently teaches undergraduate courses in Criminal Justice for Florida State University and the University of Phoenix on a part-time basis and serves as a member of the Executive Advisory Board for the Florida Fusion Center which is recognized by the Department of Homeland Security as Florida's primary node for intelligence collection and dissemination.
